Speak from the "I" perspective: Avoid speaking for others by using "we," "us" or "them"

Listen Actively: Listen to understand, not to respond. Sometimes we are tempted to start formulating our response, instead let's give 100% of our focus to whomever is speaking.

Step up, step back: If you usually speak often or find yourself talking more than others, challenge yourself to learn in to listening and opening space for others. If you usually don't talk as much in groups and do a lot of thinking and processing in your own head, know that the group would love to hear from you, and challenge to bring your voice forward in the conversation

Community Agreements

Respect Silence: Don't force yourself to fill silence. Silence can be an indication of thought and process.

Share, even if you don't have the right words: Suspend judgement and allow others to be unpolished in their speaking. If you are unsure of their meaning, then ask for clarification.

Uphold confidentiality: Treat the honesty of others as a gift. Assume that personal identities, experiences, and perspectives shared in this space are confidential unless you are given permission to use them.

Lean into discomfort: Learning happens on the edge of our comfort zones. Push rself to be open to new ideas and experiences even if they initially seem

- · Respect different ways of knowing.







Groups 4 Security (G4S)

Palestine

- Provides equipment and services to Israeli checkpoints in the West Bank and along the route of Israel's apartheid wall and to the terminals from which Gaza is kept under continuous siege.
- Provides goods and services to Israeli police in the West Bank
- Offers security to private businesses and homes in illegal Israeli settlements in occupied Palestine

The World


- Operates private prisons in Europe, Africa, and Australia
- Provides transportation for deportees who are being ushered out of the US into Mexico.
- Provides transportation for deportees who are being ushered out of
- Provides "security" for numerous agencies as well as rehabilitation services for young girls "at risk"

"The War on Terror"

America's Invasion of Afghanistan and Iraq

- Has been used as a justification of anti-Muslim racism
- Further legitimized the Israeli occupation of Palestine
- Redefined the repression of immigrants
- Directly led to the militarization of local police departments in America
- Defensive Excess Property Program
 - Response to police execution of Michael Brown (BLM 2016)
 - Response to police execution of George Floyd (BLM 2020)

The Different Drum: Community Making and Peace



Peck defines community as group of individuals "who have learned how to communicate honestly with each other, whose relationships go deeper than their masks of composure, and who have developed some significant commitment to 'rejoice together, mourn together,' and to 'delight in each other, and make others' conditions our own."

Ch. 8 - Community: Loving Communion, "All About Love"








"Embracing a cove ethic means that we utilize all the dimensions of love – 'care, commitment, trust, responsibility, respect, and knowledge in our everyday lives.
